### Autism in Schools

Creating capable environments means thinking about;

- How individuals communicate
- Personalised routines and activities
- Environments which meet the individual's needs/preferences in respect of space, aesthetics (including sensory preferences), noise, lighting etc

Changing the environment and not the child

When a flower doesn't bloom, you fix the environment in which it grows, not the flower.



### Families told us.....

- > There were too many missed opportunities in their child's education journey
- Small issues were often left to escalate into major problems

#### Shropshire Parent Carers asked for;

- Improved understanding of Autism
- Early support and intervention to avoid negative impact on mental health
- Recognition of the impact of sensory needs
- Support to reduce the isolation of autistic students
- Improve communication between families and school

## Working with Parent Carers



#### Things to think about;

- Finding the right place for parent carers to meet – somewhere they will feel safe to share their ideas and experiences. That might be in school or in a community space and it might be with or without school staff present
- The use of social media creating closed Facebook groups or What's App groups – enables ongoing communication and discussion and provides more flexibility
- Facilitation of groups support to be solution focused
- Create regular opportunities for parent carers to share feedback and ideas with senior management team

## Other Benefits

#### Peer support

- Accessing a wider network of support
- Information sharing
- Building resilience and confidence
